Workshops

Led by a practising teacher, ensuring relevance to you and your classroom

Short stories and poems

With a focus on pre-20th century literature, this workshop will build confidence to bring literature wholeheartedly into the MFL classroom. We will discuss activities that will improve students' written and spoken responses to literature, and seek inspiration from our reading in our students' creative output.

Fiction and theatre

Looking at major 20th-century texts, this workshop will develop students' literary analysis of lengthier and more complex texts. We will consider how not to burst the target-language bubble when branching out and use excerpts from great writers to open up their work across the key stages.

This day will be led by Seth Auckland, an MFL teacher and Head of Year at Bexley Grammar School, where seven languages are taught, all students take at least two to GCSE and uptake is thriving at both A Level and IB.
