

Minna is Senior Lecturer in English. She has taught English Literature from the Medieval to the contemporary, but has particular teaching interests in C19th popular culture. Her current research focuses on fin-de-siècle print culture, genre (particularly Gothic and crime fiction), London literatures and spatial theory.
