Dr David Lees, University of Warwick

David is a Senior Teaching Fellow who teaches and researches modern French culture, history and politics. He has worked with teachers and students of French at all levels for over a decade, and his publications include a co-edited book on *Vichy France and Everyday Life* and the forthcoming *Routledge Handbook of French Politics and Culture* and a new edition of the textbook *Contemporary France*.

Teaching French representations of the Holocaust: The case of 'Un Sac de Billes' - 'Un Sac de Billes' is an optional text on all of the major French A Level exam boards, which follows the experiences of a boy who is forced to navigate the complexities of the dual anti-Semitic policies of the Vichy regime and the German occupiers. In this talk, we will examine approaches to teaching and learning the occupation of France and the Holocaust at A Level, applying best practice to the major themes of the text, while also exploring the difficulties of representation with regards to film adaptations of this and other Holocaust texts in France.
